ShoreBank Helps to Prevent Foreclosures in Auburn Gresham

ere is a statistic that may shock you: Foreclosure activity in Chicago is currently more than twice the national average. Year-to-date, there have been in excess of 27,000 foreclosures in the state of Illinois; with more than half occurring in Chicago. This year total foreclosures in Cook County may reach 36,000, an increase of 62% over 2006.

To understand why foreclosure rates are so high in our area, it is necessary to examine the kinds of mortgage loans involved and the practices of the institutions making these loans.

According to a report by Housing Action Illinois, most borrowers in the process of signing up for adjustable rate mortgages (ARMs) mistakenly believed that they were obtaining fixed-rate loans. More than two thirds of these borrowers

ended up spending over 60% of their take-home pay on housing expenses. In addition, only 10 lenders were involved in nearly 70% of the foreclosure cases started in 2006, and
