Governor Quinn Signs Landmark Foreclosure Moratorium into Law

enate Bill 2513 reached an unprecedented milestone when Illinois Governor Pat Quinn signed it into law. This bill (which took affect immediately) provides up to a 90-day grace period for homeowners in the foreclosure process who agree to seek housing counseling. In the first 30 days a homeowner is in delinquency, lenders are prohibited from initiating foreclosure proceedings. After this period, the lender is required to notify the homeowner that they have 30 days to seek approved credit counseling before legal action may begin. Homeowners who enter into counseling will have an additional 30 days to develop a loan workout plan with their lenders.

The chief sponsors of this bill were Illinois State Senators, Terry Link (D – Waukegan) and Jacqueline Y. Collins (D - 16th District).

ecently, the Greater Auburn-Gresham Development (GADC) partnered with LISC MetroEdge to conduct an assessment of the potential for retail development in the Auburn Gresham trade area including the 79th Street Corridor. GADC and its partners have already invested in the commercial revitalization and other ancillary efforts.

Carlos Nelson, Executive Director for GADC discussed some of the goals of this current and potential retail development with students from Columbia College. Some of the objectives shared included educating Auburn Gresham constituents about the potential for commercial development in defined trade areas, and continue to support future discussions with developers and retailers.

Hosei University of Japan Tours Auburn Gresham

obuko Nishina, a graduate student from Hosei University Graduate School in Japan, and her professor, Miki Yasui, Ph.D visited Auburn Gresham's Carlos Nelson and Ernest Sanders to discuss and research community development corporations and their work with housing development and preservation and other programming at large.

Nelson discussed Auburn

Gresham's Quality of Life Plan and Foreclosure Prevention initiatives in partnership with Local Initiatives Support Corporation of Chicago (LISC/ Chicago) and MacArthur Foundation.

Sanders gave a tour of Perspectives Calumet Middle School and their new school-based health center and spoke of their Elev8 partnership with Atlantic Philanthropies.

Nelson and Sanders both learned of Japan's efforts to integrate community growth with housing initiatives.

Home Repairs for Senior Citizens must certify that there will be no rent increase as a direct result of HRAIL improvements. GADC assists seniors through the application process, making on-site assessments to determine service needs, and provide limited home improvements at no cost to the

Auburn Gresham, Englewood, and West Chatham.

applicant. The HRAIL program provides safety, security and accessibility improvements that better assist seniors to move freely and remain safely in their homes.

Repair types are limited to minor repairs that may include, but are not limited to: grab bars, handrails, fire extinguishers, carbon monoxide and smoke detectors, or window and door repair. GADC has been a delegate

agent for the Department of Community Development's HRAIL Program since 2003, repairing nearly 100 homes in the Auburn Gresham, Englewood, and West Chatham communities.

To access the HRAIL program and find the nearest agency in your ward, call 311, the city of Chicago's nonemergency hotline. Clients are assisted on a first-come, firstserve basis.

Residents will need to provide proof of age, income and ownership.
