Mayor Rahm Emanuel's First 100 Days in Office

s Chicago's newest serving chief executive officer, Mayor Rahm Emanuel, reached his first 100 days in office by hiring a new police superintendent and a new schools chief. He announced new jobs to the Chicago area, reassigned 500 police officers to street beats and pledged to reassign 500 more police officers, and work with grocery chains to end food deserts in hard pressed communities.

Among these accomplishments, the Mayor has also visited the greater Auburn Gresham community a handful of times within his first hundred days. Visits included the 69th and 95th Street CTA Red Line train stops, Simeon Career Academy, Kennedy King College, St. Sabina Church, Walgreens, BJ's Market & Bakery, 7800 Block Throop Street, and the Greater Auburn-Gresham Development Corporation.

In an interview, the Mayor highlighted the importance of the beat police officer, "as the backbone of the police department," and pledged to extend the school-day an extra 90 minutes for Chicago Public School students. "We're going to have it school by school until all our children finally get the length of day and length of year that they deserve," Emanuel said on the first day of classes for the majority of Chicago Public Schools.

The Parent Leadership in Action Network - aka The PLAN

he PLAN (Parent Leadership in Action Network) Program was designed to identify parents who have been through the fire raising their adolescent children. The goal was to hire them and train them for peer to peer community outreach.

The Greater Grand Crossing community hired 36 parents, who engaged other community residents in ongoing conversations around violence prevention, mental wellness and positive coping strategies to stress and trauma.

PLAN members are ambassadors in the community who 1) offer other parents information about proven "parenting techniques" related to protective factors (and community-based programs to refer their teens); 2) address issues of stigma and help-seeking; 3) and counter the shame and negative experiences that other parents of adolescents are facing.

GREATER AUBURN-GRESHAM DEVELOPMENT CORPORATION The protective factors include:

- Parenting Today's Teens: Adolescent "Ages and Stages"
- Effective Parent-Teen Communication: Intent vs. Impact
- Mental Wellness for Parents (Taking care of one's self and soul)
- Building Resilience in Our Children
- Support and Strength in a Crisis: Emotional First Aid
- Making the System Work for You

The PLAN reached hundreds of parents during their outreach this year, and are looking forward to reaching more parents when the program begins again next year.
