Chicago Elev8 Executive DirectorsTravel to Washington, DC to Advocate for Elev8

On December 15 and 16, 2009, Ramon Gardenhire, Elev8 Advocacy Project Manager, Federation for Community Schools and Jennifer Doeren, Senior Program Officer for Policy, Elev8 Public/Private Ventures, accompanied a team from Chicago to advocate in Washington, DC on behalf of Elev8 and the Full Service Community Schools Act, and other specific pieces of legislation that directly impact Elev8.

These meetings included the following: National Council of Raza; Department of Education, Office Full Service Community Schools; Department of Justice, Office of Justice Programs, Innovation Partnerships; Washington DC Office of the State of Illinois; Senate Health, Education, Labor & Pension Committee; Senator Richard Durbin (D-IL); Senator Roland Burris; Representative Raul Grijalva (D-AZ); Representative Luis Gutierrez (D-IL); Representative Bobby Rush (D-IL); Representative Steny Hoyer (D-MD);

This trip provided a wonderful opportunity, advance the Elev8 and community school policy agenda. By meeting with Congressional staff, national advocacy organizations, and leaders in education reform; the participants were able to continue to advance the unique role that community schools and Elev8 play in helping to reshape how education can help students thrive, families succeed, and communities grow stronger.

Elev8 Chicago Advocacy Team Finalizes 2010 Legislative and Advocacy Shared Priorities

On Wednesday, January 6, 2010, the Elev8 Chicago Advocacy Team finalized its 2010 Legislative and Advocacy Shared Priorities. The Advocacy Team is comprised of representation from the Elev8 community-based organizations, the schools, statewide advocacy partners, and school-based health centers.

The 2010 shared priorities are a direct result of numerous meetings with the Elev8 Executive Directors and reflect shared legislative and policy issues that emerged from these discussions.

As a result of these meetings, the following share priorities were articulated and adopted to help achieve the goal of producing lasting change and sustainability for Elev8 Chicago in 2010 through advocacy:

- 1. Advocate for a **\$2 million** Congressional appropriation funding stream to directly support existing and new programming for Elev8.
- 2. Advocate for inclusion of new funding to support Elev8 through the reauthorization of the Elementary and Secondary Education Act (ESEA) (formerly known as No Child Left Behind) by Congress. ESEA will be the driving force in addressing education funding and reform and will be structured to incorporate various pieces of pending legislation that support Elev8, among them "Keeping Parents and Communities Engaged Act," "Full Service Community Schools Act," and "Success in the Middle." Passage of the ESEA will help to sustain and support the academic, social supports, and parental engagement work that Elev8 conducts.
- Advocate for a \$5 million funding stream to directly support existing and new full-service community schools in Illinois, such as Elev8 schools.
- 4. Advocate the Illinois General Assembly for the passage of a responsible budget that supports the social supports that many of the Elev8 communities depend upon. Specifically, maintaining funding for the Illinois "All Kids Insurance Program," with emphasis on ensuring that non-documented individuals continue to have access under the program.
